## Brian J. Honan 5K Road Race

On Sept. 22, more than 1,000 runners took the streets of Allston for the 10th Annual Brian J. Honan 5K Road Race. Area universities, elected officials, neighbors, and families, attended the event. Harvard's Office of Public Affairs & Communications and the Harvard Business School sponsored several hundred Harvard runners and their families, as well

as a tent for registration and a home base for runners. Proceeds from the race benefited the Brian J. Honan Charitable Fund, which supports local and national programs in education, recreation, housing, and healthcare. The day also included the 30th Annual Allston-Brighton Parade, featuring the Harvard Band.

## Allston-Brighton Youth Engage in Interdisciplinary Learning at Ed Portal

This fall the Harvard Allston Education Portal welcomes a new cohort of Allston-Brighton and Gardner Pilot Academy students for the 17th semester of mentoring. From developing videos with the latest multimedia software to studying organic particles through microscopes, 25 Harvard undergraduates are using interdisciplinary approaches to mentor more than 100 Allston-Brighton youth in math, science, writing, and the arts.

The Ed Portal opened in 2008, and since then, the mentoring program has been its cornerstone academic program. The program is free and open to students who are entering 1st grade through 12th grade, who are residents of Allston-Brighton or students at the Gardner Pilot Academy. The curriculum is guided by the Ed Portal's faculty director, Robert A. Lue, and educators from Harvard's Life Sciences Outreach Program.

The 10-week fall semester will conclude in December with a showcase and open house, where mentees and mentors share their work and projects from the semester and host interactive demonstrations for their families, friends, and members of the community. Save the date for the next Ed Portal showcase and open house on Sunday, Dec. 8.

## Harvard Continues to Strengthen Partnership with Local Libraries

A longtime partner of the Boston and Cambridge Public Library systems, Harvard continues to support a range of initiatives both in the library branches and on the university's campus.

In September, the Cambridge Public Library held its citywide book club Cambridge READS at Harvard's Sanders Theatre, kicking off a new academic year of literary and education-based collaborations. Author Edwidge Danticat was introduced by a Haitian dance performance by Jean Appolon Expressions and then presented on her recent book "Claire of the Sea".

On Oct. 23, Harvard Professor of German Languages and Literature Maria Tatar will present a lecture titled "The Big Bad

Wolf Reconsidered: Predator and Prey in Fairytales Today". Professor Tatar will track how fairy tales have been revived and reinvented over the past decades and how they have migrated into the mainstream of popular culture.

Across the river in Boston, Harvard authors will present as part of the Boston Public Library Author Talk Series. Coming up on Nov. 19, Joshua Greene, associate professor of the social sciences at Harvard, will discuss his book "Moral Tribes: Emotion, Reason, and the Gap Between Us and Them."
