### <u>Master Humphrey's Clock</u> First Edition in the 88 Weekly Parts in Fine Condition

Ultimately, the weekly parts were reprinted in book form, but this set is the earliest and rarest form of *Master Humphrey's Clock*; one almost never sees the complete 88 parts in fine condition as this set is. 88 weekly parts with all frontispieces and woodengravings present; original pictorial printed wrappers—all of which are housed in a custom-made dark green quarter leather solander box. This is a collection of short stories in which Dickens introduces many characters who would go on to become major figures in his later novels. Most famous among these characters is Mr. Pickwick and his cronies—Nathaniel Winkle, Augustus Snodgrass, and Tracy Tupman—all explorers of English oddities and eccentricities. #### <u>Lord Byron's Don Juan</u> First Octavo Edition in Original Binding

Byron, Lord Gordon. *Don Juan*. London: Thomas Davison, 1820-1824. First editions of all six volumes in the octavo format (the first two volumes were published in quarto style in 1819 at which point the publisher switched to the use of octavo format). The most unusual aspect of this set is that it is bound in the original paper covered boards; a set of *Don Juan* in the original binding has come up at auction only once in 40 years. All half-titles are present (often missing). This is Byron's epic satire and one of the great poems of the English language. This set belonged to Walter Chrysler and has his leather bookplate in Volume I. One of the Great Books of the Western World. \$12,500.




## <u>Approximately 150 Copies—Unauthorized Edition</u> <u>Alfred Lord Tennyson's Poems</u>

The edition was not authorized, and when John Camden Hotten attempted to sell these books he was successfully sued by Tennyson. Hotten had to apologize, pay a small sum, and deliver all of his copies for destruction.



edition. With the plate depicting the arms & crest of "Tittlebat Titmouse, Esq" (Vol 2, pp301), which is often missing. This was one of the most successful novels of its time, being reissued many times and translated into many languages. The plot turns on the validity of certain title-deeds, and a number of legal points are involved. Inserted in Vol 1 is a 3-page autograph letter signed by Warren, dated July 12, 1859.
