
Getting-on online ✓

Where can I get expert help face to face?

Adult Education offers a range of IT courses from a tutor

Some centres offer qualification courses with many free to residents who are eligible for a concession (on JSA or UC or are aged 16 – 23 for example).

Some centres offer non-qualification courses, (and these are at a reduced rate for concessions which include receiving Housing or Council Tax benefit) for example:

- Basic computing
- Business computing
- · Buying and selling online
- iPads, Tablets, Mobiles
- · Safety and security
- Social media
- The internet

Libraries in Cornwall

Your library will have computers to access and some have volunteers to support computer users. Many also offer computer courses which are free to library members, two hour sessions for about 4 weeks for beginners.

Your library can also access all the books from the county that can help with getting more out of being online – from being better at Twitter to working out how to use your iPhone – there's probably a book your librarian can source for you for free.

Our digital wizards give their advice


- There is so much available online to help you learn more, whether it be about
 - ★ How to use your phone or tablet
 - ★ How to use software, or
 - ★ What to do about safety and security

Our digital champions compared some recommended sites to find out how good they are if you wanted to know how you how to use your iPad.

John rated them as

- I. You Tube: This is a very visual site, it has a good selection and is very helpful. It begins at the basics and goes as far as anyone could wish. It takes less than a minute to find what you want, as long as you know what it is that you are looking for.
- 2. Learn My Way: This site is relatively easy to use, is quite informative and easy to understand. It has a good list of links. It takes as long as you wish to browse but you can find what you want inside two or three minutes.
- Digital Unite: This site is also easy to use, with a clearly laid out resource guide. I found what I set myself to find in two minutes.

One word of warning about You Tube - you will often get popup adverts or have to sit through an advert before you get the video. It is rare that educative sites (like the others above) have sponsorship you won't want your children to see.

You Tube

Our champions thought that You Tube is "Great for an introduction to just click and listen but you can't search for what you want to know quickly and easily." It could also be costly to view on a pay as you go phone as it may take up a lot of bandwidth.
