#### A Note from Niki

They say the day was dark. It was the day we came to know as Good Friday.

Things looked pretty grim on that day and I take heart that, an aside message to us (other than the obvious story of salvation), is that when things look grim the story is not yet finished.

As we enter this time of Easter, I'm reminded of the sacrifice that Jesus made for humanity. He laid down his life. We hear and make those kinds of statements but I wonder if the average person on the street knows what all this Easter story means. For starters; why do we call the day that Jesus died, "Good"?

This year Easter falls very close to ANZAC day, where we also hear about people laying down their life. They, and Jesus, laid down their life for a specific purpose; so that we could live.

While some may believe Jesus to be a myth, the fact is that he is written about by non-Christian historians and in such a way that assumed his reality — i.e. they had no doubt. However, only Christians speak about Jesus dying to bring us life. Our Christian writers tell us that Jesus not only died, but on the third day (Easter Sunday), He rose from the dead. The resurrection is what makes all the difference, and the life that Jesus brings us is eternal life.

The resurrection however, could not happen without Good Friday.... that dark day when all seemed lost

We came to understand that it was on that dark day that Jesus willingly paid a spiritual penalty for a crime that was not his. This is fabulously explained by C.S. Lewis's in his story, *The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe*, but firstly explained in Old Testament writings where the community would speak the crimes of the community over an animal to be sacrificed. These ancient people then could come close to God, as their sins were considered to be transferred, and they were free. The animal paid the price for them.

This same imagery is used to explain the sacrifice of Jesus. When it comes to the resurrection, however, I love the way this is told in the C.S. Lewis story, about a deeper law of what happens when the innocent willingly gives their life to pay for the crime, then something wonderful happens... The Resurrection!

Friday is "Good" because it is the forgiveness of all our iniquities. I always feel that there is a spiritual stillness each Good Friday. It is as if all creation remembers and pays homage to the sacrifice.

That sacrifice is finished, but the story isn't. The resurrection is just around the corner.

We live our lives in-between. We are a post resurrection people who sometimes feel like we are right back there under a dark cloud. Take heart.... It has been accomplished and Sunday is on its way.

Many Blessings for your Holy Paschal (Easter) season. Niki (M.S.C. President.)


# **NEWS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS -**


