- Susan Maria Smith, MD 1847-1918—First African-American woman doctor in New York State.
- Susie King Taylor 1848-1912—First African-American U.S. Army nurse during the Civil War.
- Susan La Flesche Picotte, MD 1865-1915—First Native American woman physician.
- Mary Mahoney (1845 1926)
   1879—First African-American woman to study and work as professionally trained nurse graduating from the New England Hospital for Women and Children (Now Dimock Community Health Center), Boston.
- Jane C. Wright, MD

1938—African-American woman appointed Associate Dean and professor of surgery at New York Medical College - the position as a dean at that time was the highest post ever attained by an African-American woman in medical administration.
