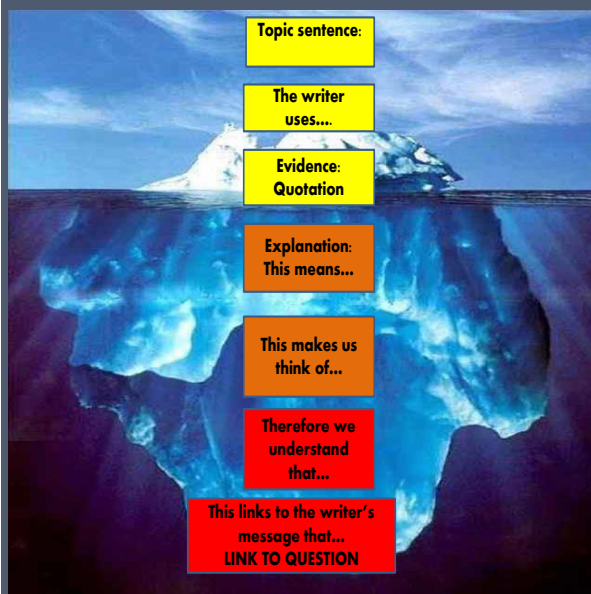


Moving on...

Once you are confident with the PEE structure to get a higher level you need to add more analysis to your explanation. An effective structure to use is the iceberg paragraph structure.



For writing analytical paragraphs, the iceberg highlights that the 'Point, Evidence' part of the paragraph is only the tip of the iceberg, and that the most important section is the explanation. The deeper the explanation, the better the paragraph.

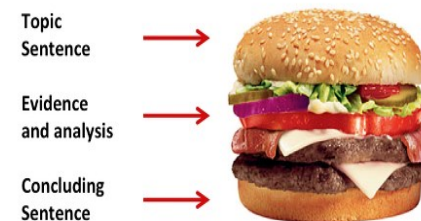

**Creating a paragraph:
Like making a burger!**



How to write a PEE Paragraph!

P– Point

You need to make your point that will be linked to the question that you have been set.

E.g Mobile Phones are better than landlines

E—Evidence

You need to support your point with some evidence to back up your ideas.

E.g Companies state that 'mobile phones cost less overall to run'.

E—Explanation

You need to explain your evidence in more detail considering how it relates to the point that you have made.

This proves that mobile phones are better than landlines. The evidence has come from a reliable company. They show that mobile phones are more cost effective.

Example PEE Paragraph

Here is an example of a basic PEE paragraph based on the novel 'Skellig'. When writing you do not need to label each of the structural heading or leave gaps.

Skellig has no table manners and is a messy eater. (Point)

"The red sauce trickled down from his lips, down over his chin on to his black jacket." (Page 27) (Evidence)

This shows that he eats in a disgusting way and gets food all over himself. It could be because he is in a rush to get food as he hasn't eaten for a long time, or perhaps he is not used to other people watching him eat. (Explanation)
