Engaging Hard-to-Reach Patients in Health-Care Decision Making

I'm proud to report that researchers from the Department of Pharmaceutical Health Services Research were recipients of funding from the Patient-Center Outcomes Research Institute to include hard-to-reach patients, who often have multiple medical problems, in health care decision-making. The contract, awarded to professor C. Maryland Poison Center's 40th Anniversary

As a vital service component of the School of Pharmacy, our Maryland Poison Center Maryland Poison Center is celebrating its 40th anniversary this UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND SCHOOL OF PHARMACY year. The Center handles more than 62,000 calls each year and has served approximately two million Marylanders in its 40 years. The Maryland Poison Center is staffed around the clock, seven days a week by specially-trained pharmacists and nurses who have provided poisoning triage, treatment recommendations, education, and prevention services to Marylanders since 1972. Center for Translational Medicine

The School of Pharmacy has launched a Center for <u>Translational Medicine</u> in our Department of Pharmacy Practice and Science, under the direction of <u>Joga</u> Gobburu, PhD, MBA, who was recruited from the FDA. Dr. Gobburu, an expert in the field of pharmacometrics, established the center with a goal of improving upon the efficiency of medical product development. The center integrates quantitative models into tools that drug developers, regulatory agencies, and other research organizations can use to guide decisions pertaining to "go/no-go", dosage, patient population, design, endpoint, analyses, and therapeutics choices. The center also has a strong education component with the offering of a Master's degree and an Executive Master's program. Read more...

Faculty Published in PNAS

Three faculty members from our Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences were recently published in the journal Proceedings of the National Academies of Science on their studies of the molecular workings of disease. Sarah Michel, PhD, Angela Wilks, PhD, and Patrick Wintrode, PhD, published three separate studies aimed at designing better-targeted drugs to fight deadly bacterial diseases and liver cirrhosis. School of Pharmacy Co-leads New Center of Excellence in Pain Education

The School was notified in late May that it is a coprincipal investigator on a new National Institutes of Health Center of Excellence in Pain Education. Under the leadership of Mary Lynn McPherson, PharmD, a professor in our Department of Pharmacy Practice and Science, and a faculty colleague at the School of Dentistry, the University will teach the next generation of health care providers to be better equipped to



manage and treat patients living with chronic pain. The NIH has selected 11 health professional education institutions as Centers of Excellence in Pain Education (CoEPEs) with the goal of using education to resolve inconsistencies in chronic pain care. Read more...
