What do you remember of that day?


Words from **Charley Moore's** speech still ring true today:



The song: The traditional version of "Men of Dartmouth" was printed in the Commencement program, along with a newer version in which a few words were changed to specifically include women. Those present were invited to sing either version.

The ceremony: A second commencement ceremony was held in the afternoon on the Cutter Hall lawn. At the much less formal ceremony, Black American poet and essayist June Jordan was keynote speaker.

Dartmouth Then and Now: Class of 1987 and Class of 2022

As we approach our 35th reunion, this is the first in a series of articles on Dartmouth then and now, comparing our class with the Class of 2022, whose commencement coincides with the 35th anniversary of our graduation.

Parents of college-aged children will not be surprised that the Class of 2022 faced more competition for admission, not just from the US, but from around the world. Applications numbered 8,000 in 1983 compared to over 22,000 in 2018. Yield rates have remained constant at 60%. The percentage of students admitted via Early Decision has increased by almost 10%. Student diversity was a major goal of Dartmouth in 1983. A recruiting weekend for African-American students in the spring of 1983 helped enroll 87 African-American students to our class, representing 8% of the class. The Class of 2022 is 5% African-American. Back then, Dartmouth lagged substantially behind other lvy League schools in recruiting international students, reflecting only 2% of the Class of 1987. They now make up 11% of the Class of 2022, with the largest number of students from China. Domestically, the percentage of students hailing from the Northeast has declined, while the percentage of students from the South and West has grown. The price of attending Dartmouth even in inflation-adjusted dollars has increased substantially and now includes more than \$1,500 in "Fees". According to an article in the Daily D, 380 students in the Class of 1987 received \$2M in scholarships, an average of \$5,263 per student. In the FY 2017-18, the average scholarship per student was \$50,398.

In February 2019, Jeffrey Hart died in Vermont at 88 years of age. He was a leading conservative thinker and columnist, and a longtime professor of English at Dartmouth. He helped found The Dartmouth Review, was a senior editor for the National Review and was a speech writer for Ronald Reagan.

In March 2019, Microbiology and Immunology professor Elmer Pfefferkorn, winner of 15 teaching awards, died. He was 87 years old. Chair of the Department during our years in Hanover, he went on to teach generations of medical students at the Geisel School of Medicine.

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Andrew Reed's BrewHouse

Back in 2013, after spending considerable time at a local brewery that opened in my area, I decided to pursue craft beer as a business opportunity. Realizing that opening a brewery took a significant amount of money, I chose a path where our establishment would look and feel like a brewery, but would feature other people's beers. The BrewHouse opened in November of 2014, featuring 30 taps of craft beer that rotate constantly.

I cringe at the early photos of the place, as our limited budget prevented us from fully furnishing the space, or adding the right kind of lighting, or a good stereo system. But the locals of San Juan Capistrano embraced the concept and we have now grown into a popular local



watering hole. I have relinquished my role behind the bar and have returned to the corporate world. My wife now manages the taproom and our employees. I currently refer to the place as my "adult treehouse" where I can catch up with regulars and friends on evenings and weekends, and continue our process of constant improvement through various projects.

In a few years, when my youngest is off to college, I foresee getting back to The BrewHouse on a more regular basis. We are halfway between Los Angeles and San Diego, and I encourage anyone making the trip between the two to stop in for a beer!

In addition, because of an English class that focused on Toni Morrison's work, I was exposed to and fell in love with her novels and was fortunate to meet her when she Keynoted one of my Center's conferences.

What keeps you busy outside your day job? Passions? Pursuits?

I have two amazing kids, a husband, and a dog. They keep me delightfully busy. We live near the Potomac River and one of my favorite things is to be outside hiking along the Billy Goat Trail next to the river. Just as Dartmouth drew me to it with its beautiful setting, DC, with its easy escapes to nature, drew me too.

Who are you still in touch with from our class? Outside of Facebook (!), I see Luanne Zurlo, Lisa Shabel, Caroline Brown Lintner, and Kathy Selig Brown most regularly. When we all gather for a long weekend, we can be seen dancing outside to "It's Raining Men." And you and I have just reconnected, which has been so fun.

What (if anything) would you change about your time at Dartmouth?

That's a tough one. I loved my time at Dartmouth and can't imagine it changing in any way. But perhaps, I would have taken more classes with the professors I loved outside of my major because those are the classes that have had the greatest impact on me to this day.



Last year we launched the '87 Compassion Network with the mission to provide support for classmates and their families through a network of classmate volunteers who have professional or personal experience in areas of need.

The '87 Compassion Network provides a support system of '87 volunteers for classmates who are undergoing challenging life events. If a classmate or their family is experiencing a serious illness or dealing with the loss of a loved one, the Network is available to provide assistance. This is a confidential way for classmates to seek information or to talk to classmates with relevant life or professional experience.



Brian Venerable

I live with my wife and our blended family in Altadena, California and am a chiropractor in private practice for more than 20 years. I also work with area high school and youth football programs as the team chiropractor and have done several mission trips to Baja California, Mexico to treat the indigent population. I also participate in several screening events annually in and around the community promoting healthy lifestyles.

I have seen untold maladies remedied with chiropractic medicine. In the Fall of 2004, we experienced the unthinkable. Our six-year old son Ezekiel had a seizure overnight and never regained consciousness. He died in the hospital 2 days later. There were no warnings. No previous illness. It was sudden and final. Several people, including Dartmouth people, walked with us in the ensuing days, weeks months and years. I'm humbled to be included in the Dartmouth Compassion Network.

Tell us a little about your path since graduation... I served as a Volunteer in the Peace Corps in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, where I worked with women to increase their economic empowerment. We established a business cooperative for their artisan products. Afterwards, I went to law school at the University of Wisconsin. During law school, I learned about sexual harassment law while studying feminist legal theory, employment discrimination law, and watched Anita Hill testify during the confirmation hearings for (now) Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas. After graduation and clerking, I received a fellowship in Washington, D.C. to focus on representing employees in sexual harassment cases and I continued that work for seven years. I then became a law professor, still focused on gender and economic empowerment issues, but through the lens of domestic violence, family law, and reproductive justice. I am now a tenured professor at the University of Baltimore School of Law where I co-direct the Center on Applied Feminism and Direct the Bronfein Family Law Clinic.

As a professor, what do you like best? How did your time at Dartmouth impacted your teaching style?

I love engaging in applied research and community-based social justice projects with my students. Our most recent work includes being a member of the Reproductive Justice Inside Coalition, which has resulted in new laws requiring reproductive healthcare policies for female inmates in Maryland and – believe it or not – the provision of menstrual products, which were not readily accessible. This work has led me to publish a piece entitled Menstrual Justice that looks at all the ways menstruation has been used to control people who menstruate in the workplace, prisons and jails, schools, etc. In many ways it has brought me back to my roots

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Bill Bradley's Keynote Address, June 14, 1987

Bill Bradley, at the time of our graduation, was in his second term as a Democratic Senator from New Jersey. A Princeton graduate, he was the NCAA Player of the Year in 1965, the year most of us were born. A Rhodes Scholar and a gold medalist in the Olympics, he played ten years of professional basketball for the New York Knicks, winning two championship titles.

"I envy you for things you will see and know that my generation never dreamed of."

"I hope your dreams go beyond personal ambition and the accumulation of material goods. I want you to have a bigger ambition—an ambition that drives you to excel for the sake of excellent, not vanity—an ambition that forces you to decide what is right as much as what pays—an ambition that disciplines desires in order to meet needs. In short, an ambition for yourself as a citizen as much as a private individ—ual; an ambition for yourself as a citizen who sees your own well-being tied to the well-being of your community and who believes that **in the end what matters is how you've treated your neighbor."**
