- II. **Course Description:** This course is an introduction to the vocabulary, concepts, and theoretical perspectives of sociology.
- III. **Prerequisite:** None.
- IV. **Textbook:** *Society, The Basics* by John Macionis, 12th edition.

V. Course Competencies and Objectives/ Student Learning Outcomes Students will:

VII. Evaluation and Assessment

There will be a total of four tests, including the final. The tests may be a combination of multiple choice, short answer, and essay. The tests will cover lecture material and assigned readings. You will need a scantron and a pencil for each test. There will be quizzes throughout the semester (both scheduled and pop quizzes). Quizzes will be worth 10-20 points each – this may seem small but they add up quickly and are worth more than a major test in the end. You will be able to drop 20 points of quiz grades. Remember, quizzes may not be made up in case of an absence or tardy so if you miss 20 points, those will be your dropped quiz points and you will receive a zero on the remaining quizzes you miss. A quiz grade may consist of an assignment given in class such as an essay, vocabulary, or pop quiz. You will have one project worth 100 points which will be outlined at a later date. If your project is turned in late, EVEN WITH A VALID EXCUSE, YOU WILL HAVE 10 POINTS DEDUCTED FOR EVERY DAY IT IS LATE !!!!!

Make-Up Policy: A make-up exam is only given in extenuating circumstances. If a student misses a test, it is his/her responsibility to contact the instructor and register within 2 weeks of the test, to take a make-up test at the end of the semester. If the student missed the test due to an excusable absence and is allowed to make up the test, make-up day is indicated on the course calendar. This is the ONLY day for make-up exams!!! There are no exceptions!!! Make-up quizzes will NOT be given, for scheduled or nonscheduled (pop) quizzes. The only thing you are allowed to make up is ONE major exam. If you arrive late on make-up day, you forfeit your opportunity for a make-up exam.

VIII. Attendance:

Students are expected to attend all classes for which they are registered. Students who are unable to attend class regularly, regardless of the reason or circumstance, should withdraw from that class before poor attendance interferes with the student's ability to achieve the objectives required in the course. Students will be responsible for obtaining any information that was discussed or distributed in class and for any assignments that were given in class.

Withdrawal from class can affect eligibility for federal financial aid. Students on financial aid programs are responsible for knowing their particular attendance policies, if any. Those students must contact the financial aid office to receive written attendance reporting requirements.

Attendance will be taken from the first day of the student's official enrollment. If a student arrives late, it is the student's responsibility to tell the instructor to change the absent to a late before he/she leaves. If you arrive late on the day that a quiz is being given, you have only as much time as the rest of the class needs. Also, if you arrive late on the day a test is being given, I am assuming that you do not need the full allotment of time; therefore, you will be asked to turn in your test when the last person, who arrived on time, is finished with their test.
