Creative Book Projects

- 1. Re-write the story as a picture book for young children
- 2. Create a webpage about this book
- 3. Make a chart to compare and contrast a character in this book to yourself
- 4. Write a report card for a character from this book, including grades and comments
- 5. Create a scrapbook from the point of view of a character from this book
- 6. Write a chapter to show what happens after the "end" of this book
- 7. Present a commercial explaining why others should read this book
- 8. Illustrate a bookmark highlighting the important messages in this book
- 9. Create an illustrated timeline showing the important events in this book
- 10. Select a birthday gift for each important character in this book, and explain why each gift is appropriate for each character in a spoken presentation
- 11. Create a behavior over time graph to measure something in the book that changes during the story (like power, affection, confidence, ability, or others)
- 12. Write postcards to the protagonist from three different characters in the book. Use language and feelings to show the different points of view on each card.
- 13. Re-write a scene or chapter of the book as if it were in a different setting (during the Civil War, a desert island, the Wild West, in the White House, or some other setting)
- 14. Create a museum exhibit to teach a topic from the book (like art, chess, and mythology)
- 15. Re-write a scene from the book using a different style of language (much more formal, much more casual, from a different time period, like aliens, or other)
- 16. Choreograph and perform a dance that tells the story of the book without words
- 17. Write a review of the book (submit it towww.conversationpieceslearning.org)
- 18. Memorize and perform an important scene from the book
- 19. Write a letter to the author about what the book means to you
- 20. Write a letter to your teacher explaining why a different book is better than this one
- 21. Write a sequel to this book
- 22. Write a chapter of this book from a different character's point of view
- 23. Perform a talk show interview "with" a character from the book

- 24. Make a poster showing how this book belongs to a particular genre
- 25. Organize a discussion group (online or in person) about the book
- 26. Write an essay describing what you think you know about the author from reading

the book

- 27. Use 7 fantastic vocabulary words (or short phrases) to describe the main characters in this book
- 28. Write a letter to a character in the book about a mistake, and what you think that character should have done differently
- 29. Invent a game (sport, board, word, logic, or other) inspired by the book
- 30. Make a chart to define what each character loves, wants, fears, and hates most
- 31. Choose 3 important themes, messages, or ideas in this book. Create a display showing how your original illustrations and quotes from the book fit with each theme.
- 32. Draw a detailed illustration showing a character's favorite dream, and display it next to a detailed illustration showing that same character's worst nightmare
- 33. Make a chart showing how this book is similar to five other books you have read (you can think about setting, theme, characters, genre, language, plot, and more)
- 34. Create a dictionary or thesaurus featuring challenging vocabulary in the book
- 35. Create a map showing important locations in the book
- 36. Make a bulletin board with questions to consider about the book
- 37. Develop a secret code, and use it to make a poster with key facts about the book (this works best with mysteries)
- 38. Design a survey about an issue in the book, and graph your results
- 39. Write a letter of recommendation for a character applying for a specific job
- 40. Imagine the characters 10 years later, and design a "Where Are They Now" poster
