



# Architecture of the Mask in Play

## Description:

What to show, and what to hide.

"Mask" is a fundamental quality in architecture. For instance, the mask of "Face House" by Kazumasa Yamashita gives a special meaning to architecture by hiding most of the house's contents. On the other hand, "Fransworth House" by Mies Van der Rohe is covered with a tremendously transparent mask.

This workshop explores various possibilities between the two aforementioned extreme examples. We do so by using an unsual material for architecture: bell peppers. This vegetable is hollow inside; it is easy to cut and make openings freely.

Consider the bell pepper as a building on a scale of 1 to 100, make openings then add (cardboard) floors and walls on the inside and outside to create an original architecture.

What to show, and what to hide. Make your creative interpretations of the mask!

Green, Red, Yellow, and Orange Peppers + Cardboards
