0	To develop budget adequate for successful passing of the ASHA/CAA site visit scheduled for Fall 2014.		
11	To paint/renovate the sound-proffed audiological booth and replace the cloudy/scarred observation window so that visibility of the client by the tester meets minimal standards.
