

Arts encourages, supports, and bridges artistic research with scholarly thought and dialog to address social, political, and religious issues within a visual language.

Our small, diverse, and energetic faculty and staff teach and support multiple disciplines of arts that enrich not only the



humanities, but also the sciences, political and social sciences, music, business, engineering, and architecture. Our department offers courses in sculpture, critical theory, drawing, painting, photography, printmaking, acting, directing, stage design, film production and criticism. With the addition of special topics courses covering anything from video art to drawing for video games, our modestly staffed program bridges a wide range of academic possibilities.

One of the largest departments with regard to student enrollment in the School of Humanities, the Department of Visual and Dramatic Arts is an interdisciplinary department with a working state-of-the-art cinema that screens films from around the world as well as a 500-seat proscenium-style performing arts theatre staging two theatrical productions each year, with collaborative ties with the Globe Theatre in London; National Theater Institute's Eugene O'Neill Theater Center; and the Actors from the London Stage.

Our department works closely with local art venues such as The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston; MFAH Glassell School of Art; The Holocaust Museum; Southwest Alternate Media Project (SWAMP); Alley Theatre; and the Houston Center for Photography to collaborate on interdisciplinary programs, events, and exhibitions that enhance and enrich the academic curriculum across the university.

Our faculty contribute significantly as artists on the local, national, and international levels with distinguished awards from the Guggenheim Foundation; National Endowment for the Arts; Rockefeller Artist Residency; and the Cultural Arts Council of Houston. In addition, our faculty's work have been exhibited (or are in the permanent collections of) the Whitney Museum of American Art; Royal Academy of London; the National Museum of American Art in the Smithsonian; London Institute of Contemporary Arts; Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; Tacoma Film Festival; and The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston. As a result of these achievements, alumni of our department have gone on to distinguished graduate programs across the country and have earned notable awards—most recently an Emmy for cinematography for a documentary film.

Theatre track majors are encouraged to take Lifetime Physical Activity Program (LPAP) courses to supplement and enhance their studies in theatre. Courses include (but not limited to): LPAP 148, Dance Choreography; LPAP 130, Contact Improvisation; LPAP 155, Introduction to Ballet; LPAP 133, Capoeira; LPAP 157, Jazz Dance/Hip Hop; and LPAP 151, The Alexander Technique. Students should receive departmental approval and have already satisfied the LPAP graduation requirements before enrolling. Students may not take more than 4 LPAP courses for credit.

#### **Rice Theatre Program**

Rice Theatre Program curriculum offers a solid foundation in all aspects of theatrical production from acting and directing to technology and design for students who wish to pursue a professional career in theatre or continue on to a graduate program. Theatre courses are also open to non-majors who want to gain a greater appreciation for the art of

There are two main-stage productions and the possibility of two student showcases offered each year in Hamman Hall—a 500-seat proscenium theatre facility. The department invites distinguished guest artists each semester to direct and produce the two main-stage productions. Participation in productions is open to all students.

#### **Transfer Credit**

No more than two courses may be transferred for the single or double major to satisfy degree requirements for BA in Visual and Dramatic Arts degree. The two transfer credit courses must be studio, film, photography, or theatre practice courses required for all majors. Advanced placement credit may not be used by Visual and Dramatic Arts majors to fulfill department degree requirements.

Entering transfer students who are transferring coursework from another accredited college or university will be allowed to transfer their undergraduate art courses. Students must speak with the department chairman immediately upon transferring to

The Department of Visual and Dramatic Arts will accept academic work completed in the Spring at NYU program as well as the National Theater Institute program, Eugene O'Neill Theater Center, as transfer credit to fulfill major requirements (following university transfer credit guidelines).

#### Museum of Fine Arts, Houston Glassell School of Art Core Fellows

The Department of Visual and Dramatic Arts, in partnership with the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston Glassell School of Art, supports up to six Glassell Core Fellowship recipients each year to teach studio practice and critical theory courses. These Core Fellowship recipients, selected by the MFAH from the highly competitive and prestigious Glassell School of Art Core Fellowship Residency Program, are postgraduate artists and art educators.

#### Actors from the London Stage

In even number years, the Theatre Program, sponsored by the Alan and Shirley Grob Endowment for Shakespeare in Performance, hosts the Actors From the London Stage—one of the oldest established touring Shakespeare theater companies in the world—for a week-long residency of workshops, performances, and lectures. Each tour presents a full-length play by Shakespeare performed by five classically trained actors who come from such prestigious companies as the Royal Shakespeare Company; the Royal National Theatre of Great Britain; and Shakespeare's Globe Theatre.

On campus, the Rice University Art Gallery presents a season of commissioned and site-specific installations by international painters, sculptors, photographers, and videographers, while movie buffs can study both classic and new world films at the Rice Film Program.

An Houston arts are not confined to two or three dimensions. Houston supports resident symphony, opera, repertory theater, and ballet companies. Walk across the street to hear free outdoor concerts at Hermann Park or stay on campus and listen to the sounds emanating from Rice's own Shepherd School of Music.
