

already quoted Shakespeare today and you didn't even know it. Seriously, there are at least 1,500 different words and phrases that don't appear anywhere prior to the Bard of Avon putting them on paper.

We can thank Shakespeare for the word "alligator." In the last act of *Romeo and Juliet*, Romeo plans his own suicide by securing poison from a nearby apothecary who keeps "...in his needy shop a tortoise hung, / An alligator stuff'd, and other skins..." Alligator became part of the English language in 1677 and the short form, "gator," was first recorded in the nineteenth century. Of course, gator now forms the cornerstone of UF's brand and the battle cry of loyal fans.

Another universally used phrase attributable to Will Shakespeare is, "The world's my oyster," a saying that declares that the earth's abundance is ours to leisurely pluck from the shell. But don't tell that to the crashing oyster population of Apalachicola Bay, which accounts for 90 percent of Florida's oyster harvest and 10 percent of the nation's yield. After decades of reduced riversupply flows, overharvesting and drought, and despite restoration efforts, there is not enough fresh water for the oysters to rebound.

Perhaps "To be, or not to be," the famous opening phrase of Shakespeare's *Hamlet*, might be a more apt pearl of wisdom for our Gulf oysters?
