





Information will be available in November for the spring semester scholarship offerings. The Allston-Brighton Community Scholars Program awards up to 10 Allston-Brighton residents full tuition remission on any one course at the Harvard Extension School. Scholarships are awarded through the Allston Civic Association to Allston-Brighton residents through an application process each semester.

Each fall, spring, and summer semester, Harvard University provides up to 15 scholarships to Allston-Brighton residents for one course at the Harvard Extension School's Institute for English Language Programs. Each scholarship covers the cost of full tuition for one course. Recipients are responsible for payment of books, supplies, registration fees and transportation/parking.

HARVARD CERAMICS PROGRAM AND THE ALLSTON-BRIGHTON FOOD PANTRY TEAM TOGETHER ON NOVEMBER 1ST FOR EMPTY BOWLS EVENT

On Thursday, November 1, the Harvard Ceramics Program will host Empty Bowls, a charity event to support the Harvard Square Homeless Shelter and the Allston-Brighton Food Pantry. Inspired by the international grassroots effort to fight hunger, Shawn Panepinto, director of the Harvard Ceramics Program, is bringing Empty Bowls to Harvard. The ticket price includes a simple meal of soup, bread, salad, and dessert, and a handcrafted bowl, created specifically for this event by potters, craftspeople and educators as a reminder of all the empty bowls in the world. All proceeds will be donated to the Allston-Brighton Food Pantry and the Harvard Square Homeless Shelter.

The Allston-Brighton Food Pantry was founded in 1974 by Evelyn Ware, a member of the Brighton Allston Congregational Church. She used her own money and cooked meals in her own kitchen and brought them to the church. The pantry now serves 50 - 75 meals at the weekly community supper and distributes approximately 150 food baskets each month to income-eligible residents of Allston-Brighton. In November, they expect to distribute 400 holiday baskets. The Allston-Brighton Food Pantry is run almost entirely by volunteers and more than 5,720 volunteer hours make the food pantry and community supper a success.
