## A higher percentage of UC Berkeley undergraduate students (36\%) receive Pell Grants than the combined Ivy League (17\%).

As an indicator of the University's ongoing commitment to economic diversity in our student population, our Pell Grant recipient counts are compared to peers using annual reporting from the U.S. Office of Postsecondary Education (OPE).

## 2013-14 Pell Grant Awards



This represents the most recent data published by OPE, which is the best source for peer data due to the consistent, near-final reconciliation methodology that is employed.

Pell Grant Description: The Federal Pell Grant Program provides need-based financial aid for low-income undergraduates through some 5,400 participating colleges and universities. The amount of the award is determined by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE) using a standard formula, and depends on student's financial need, the cost to attend, and full or part-time attendance status.

In comparing the number of Pell Grant awards as a percentage of the undergraduate population, Berkeley's $36 \%$ is higher than the lvy League average of $17 \%$ and the highest of the 8 schools (Columbia's 22\%).

The data shows I\% decline in Pell Grant awards over the prior year for Berkeley, while Ivy League schools ranged from a $5 \%$ decline (Yale) to an II\% increase (Brown). The change for all lvies combined is a $1 \%$ increase.

Berkeley has the second lowest percentage among UC campuses which range from a high of $62 \%$ at Merced to a low of $32 \%$ at Santa Barbara. Only Berkeley and San Diego $(-2 \%)$ had a decline in the number of Pell Grant recipients between 2012 and 2013.
