## Getting Mathematica on your home computer (for IIT students)

### Downloading Mathematica:

- Log on to the myiit portal and select the tab called “Training and Support”.
- On the right side of the page, there will be a box with OTS downloads. At the top of the box will be the Mathematica downloads.
- Click on “OSX” , “Linux”, or “Windows” depending on the operating system your home machine is running. The download will begin (it is a large file). Note: If this doesn't work, try the following URL's:

### Running Mathematica the first time:

After *Mathematica* is downloaded and installed (you may need to run the executable file you downloaded to install it), run the program. When *Mathematica* is run the first time it will request that you enter an activation code before you can use the features of the program. To obtain this code:

- Click on the “student license activation” link in the OTS downloads box (myiit portal, Training and Support tab).
- A new browser tab should open: the Wolfram User Portal with the *Mathematica* Activation Key Request Form.
- Type your iit e-mail address where it asks for your e-mail address and click on Continue without signing in (instead of creating an account with a password).
- Fill in the information on the new page that appears and click on submit.
- You should then be given the activation code (a copy sent to your e-mail).
- Type (or copy and paste) this code into the request box you got when you first ran *Mathematica*.
