Respiratory Therapist Program Expectations

I. Choosing a health care profession:

The decision to work in the health care profession should be based on an understanding of various health care professions. Some health professions require working in intense situation with terminally ill or severely injured people. Respiratory therapy requires working with all types of people and various types of environments including, but not limited to rehabilitation centers, intensive care units, polysomnography labs, and private homes.

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should feel comfortable working with person with various breathing-related illnesses, and have the desire to help alleviate these conditions.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should be able to treat and render assistance to all individuals, of all cultures, across the lifespan, without prejudice and repulsion.


II. The profession of Respiratory Therapy:

Critical to the selection of a profession is the understanding of what the profession is, and what the profession does. Not everyone is suited to a specific profession.

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist program knows the basic functions of the profession and agrees with the basic philosophy and practice of Respiratory Therapy.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program has a basic understanding and agrees with the philosophy of the Respiratory Therapist Program at Allegany College of Maryland.

III. Communications with other individuals and groups:

In Respiratory Therapy, the therapist is required to communicate and build relationships with other individuals of all ages, race, sex, and cultural differences. Therpists are required to communicate in groups. They should have an interest in several subjects in order to converse on a casual and therapeutic basis.

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program must be able to communicate both orally and in writing, and be able to hear and see accurately to gather information and assess the patient.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should have some experience working with groups or clubs and would benefit from the role of a leader in a group or club.

IV. Performance of duties:

Respiratory Therapy is a medically related profession. Independently being able to perform duties is a must. Personal, physical, or mental problems and other employment, regardless of nature, should not interfere with the performance of assignments and class/clinic attendances.

Expectations:

Candidates for the Respiratory Therapist Program are responsible for their own transportation to and from clinical and didactic courses.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program will be responsible for the cost of traveling, food, as well as housing, if necessary, when attending didactic courses and clinical rotations.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should be a responsible individual. Those students must meet the requirement set forth in the college Respiratory Therapy Department as well as requirements set forth at all clinical affiliation sites.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program must be able to reach, manipulate and operate the equipment necessary to work with patients. A candidate must also be able to move, transfer, manipulate and observe a patient as necessary to perform didactic and clinical assignments.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should be able to demonstrate emotional and psychological health in day-to-day situations with patients and staff in routine and non-routine situation and in daily didactic and clinical situations.

V. Policies and procedures:

The Respiratory Therapy student is responsible for adhering to the policies and procedures of Allegany College of Maryland and all organizations they attend for their clinical rotations.

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program shall seek knowledge of and abide by all policies and procedures of the college and clinical affiliation sites.

VI. Appearance:

Respiratory Therapy if a medically related profession. Often, the medical profession is critical of certain attire for safety and patient care reasons. For example, some affiliation sites prohibit abstract jewelry, heavy perfumes/cologne, etc.

VII. Response to emergency situations:

Health care professionals frequently engage in emergency situations. CPR and other emergency training are required of respiratory therapists.

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should be able to respond and demonstrate appropriate judgement in emergency situations.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program must be able to complete a course in American Heart Association BLS CPR and remain current with certification.

VII. Professional Ethics:

Professional ethics is the rightness and wrongness in relation to performing duties and responsibilities of a profession. The <u>Code of Ethics</u> for Respiratory Therapy profession is a public statement of the values and principles used in promoting and maintaining high standards of behavior in Respiratory Therapy. The <u>Code of Ethics</u> is a set of principles that applies to Respiratory Therapy personnel at all levels.

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should be able to develop a sense of rightness and wrongness appropriate to employment in a health care setting, and adhere to the <u>Code of</u> Ethics at all times.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should have a set of ethical behaviors that will allow them to be receptive to professional ethics, teaching and enabling them to practice in a health care setting.

IX. Criminal Background Check:

Respiratory Therapy Program clinical sites require a criminal background check prior to accepting a student for rotations. The respiratory program contracts with an independent agency to perform criminal background checks and the cost of the service is included as a course fee in the first semester of the clinical phase of the program. The results of the criminal background check are reported to the Respiratory Therapy Program Director. If a student has any criminal history, he or she may not be able to complete clinical rotations. If two (2) clinical affiliates deny the student of clinical experience within their respective facility, the student will not be able to complete the program. In addition a criminal history may prevent the student from becoming certified and licensed to practice respiratory therapy. Graduates of the program are eligible to sit for the certification examination administered by the National Board for Respiratory Therapy (NBRC).

Expectations:

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should have a clean criminal record.

A candidate for the Respiratory Therapist Program should understand that during enrollment in the program, any official change, or the initiation of any governmental proceeding affecting the information revealed by the initial criminal background check must be reported immediately to the director of the program.
